#### 1. First Mennonite Church Champaign-Urbana Joins SCN

BMC is pleased to announce that First Mennonite Church Champaign-Urbana, after a process of education and discernment, has become the latest congregation to join the Supportive Communities Network as a congregation that is publicly affirming of lgbt people. Their inclusion statement reads: "Seeking to experience the full richness of Christ's body, we welcome into fellowship and membership all persons who confess faith in Jesus Christ, inclusive of diversity of age, gender, race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, economic or social class, education, and physical or mental condition."

However, we are graciously recognized by the <a href="mailto:Lutheran Volunteer">Lutheran Volunteer</a> Corps and the Volunteer Ministries of the <a href="mailto:United Church of Christ">United Church of Christ</a>, who offer their programmatic support for this position.

The Pearlstone Conference and Retreat Center in Reisterstown, Maryland, is the site for the annual Connecting Families Weekend on March 18-20, 2011. This is a wonderful opportunity for Mennonite and Brethren parents and families with lgbt members as well as lgbt people themselves, to gather to share stories, relax in a supportive environment, and work at ways to educate and engage the church in dialogue and understanding. This year's theme is One in Christ: Dividing Walls Destroyed and will be led by the planning committee. ## 7. Save the Date - Progressive Brethren Gathering

## 8. Transgender Rights Bill - Canada

Gender identity is currently not included in the <u>Canadian Human Rights Act</u>, which prohibits discrimination against particular groups of people. Sexual orientation was added in 1996. This week you can help ensure that transgender people receive the same protections lesbian, gay and bisexual people have gained. Bill C-389 has been moved up on the House of Commons Order Paper thanks to cooperation between MPs Olivia Chow and <u>Bill Siksay</u>. Debate in the House begins February 7, with a vote expected the evening of February 9. Find out how your MP voted on the first reading of the bill (which passed narrowly in December), and encourage them to attend and to vote in favour of rights for all people. The bill would then progress to the Senate.

## 9. US Passports Slightly Easier for Transgender People

Recent revisions to policies regarding changing the gender on passports means it will be slightly easier for transgender people to obtain accurate forms of identification. Under the updated policy, an individual can submit a letter from a "licensed physician who has treated the (passport) applicant or reviewed and evaluated the medical history of the applicant"

(<u>www.state.gov/documents/organization/143160.pdf</u>). This is a small but important step towards justice and dignity for the transgender community. #### 10. State of Higher Education for LGBT People

Not surprisingly, this 2010 report (<a href="www.campuspride.org">www.campuspride.org</a>) on post-secondary institutions in the US reveals the harassment and discrimination that lgbt students, faculty and stuff face on campuses. The report outlines best practices for creating positive climates that in turn benefit students' educational experiences such as: develop inclusive policies, demonstrate institutional commitment, integrate lgbtq issues and concerns in curricular and co-curricular education, respond appropriately to anti-lgbtqq incidents/bias, create brave spaces for student dialogues in on-campus housing, offer comprehensive counseling and healthcare, and improve recruitment and retention efforts.

## 11. Ugandan LGBT Rights Activist Killed

David Kato of <u>Sexual Minorities Uganda</u> was killed at his home on January 27. According to <u>Amnesty International</u>, various human rights organizations "have documented the steady increase in discrimination, arbitrary arrests, incommunicado detention, torture and other ill-treatment on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity in Uganda, and against activists exposing violations against LGBT people."

Sexual Minorities Uganda has been one of the organizations advocating against the proposed Anti-Homosexuality Bill. While homosexuality is already a crime in Uganda, the bill would increase punishment to a death sentence. International media stories at the time drew connections between the legislation and several American evangelicals who visited Uganda spreading anti-lgbt messages.
