1. Nonconformity, Authenticity and Conscience

In the past few weeks, two Church of the Brethren members, <u>Ken Kline Smeltzer</u> and <u>Adam Ackley</u>, have made national news. Carol Wise, the Executive Director of BMC, comments upon the circumstances in her piece <u>Nonconformity</u>, <u>Authenticity and Conscience</u>.

Kay Guyer, Kaleidoscope Coordinator, is serving as a young adult steward at the 10 Churches in Busan, Republic of Korea. From October 22 to November 10, she will be a part of the young adult stewards program. The stewards program facilitates a space for young people to learn from one another about key issues in the ecumenical movement while also assisting with communication support at the 10th Assembly of the World Council of Churches.

Kay enters the gathering with a focused interest in learning how the movement for full lgbtq inclusion manifests in various global and denominational contexts. The goal of these conversations is to inform and strengthen our own efforts in the Mennonite and Brethren realms. Their welcoming statement begins, *As a Christian community, we are called to love our neighbor as*

Jesus loved us, and are called by Christ to be inclusive, caring and peace minded.... It is wonderful to welcome Lacey Community Church to the SCN community. They are the tenth new congregation to join SCN this calendar year!

5. BMC Oral History Project Interviews

Amy Short and Carol Wise will travel to Washington, DC and Philadelphia, PA in early November in order to collect a series of interviews for the BMC Oral History Project. The project was begun three years ago in order to celebrate and record the lives and experiences of older lgbt BMCer's, as well as collect a history of BMC. Since its inception, Amy has taped over 40 hours of interviews with nearly 20 individuals. This upcoming trip is particularly important as planned interviews include Martin Rock, the founder of BMC, and key individuals from Germantown Mennonite Church, the oldest worshipping Mennonite congregation in the United States. Germantown was expelled from its conference over 15 years ago because of its welcoming stance in a particularly brutal and disturbing fashion.

Bethel College (Newton, KS) - The Bethel College Gay-Straight Alliance is hosting a booth at this years Fall Fest in order to raise funds for activities. In addition, a queer support group has begun meeting and sharing in fellowship.

Bluffton University (Bluffton, OH) - Bluffton Safe Spaces is planning to attend *Love Across the Spectrum* conference at Ohio Wesleyan University in early November. Members look forward to meeting with other students from across the state and engaging in discussions at the intersections of Christianity, sexual orientation, and gender identity.

Eastern Mennonite University (Harrisonburg, VA) - In celebration of National Coming Out Day on October 11th, EMU Safe Space is holding the *Affirm that I Am* campaign. This project invites everyone in the EMU community to share their own stories of coming out as a way to celebrate and affirm authenticity.

Manchester University (North Manchester, IN) - United Sexualities' Pride Week took place September 30 - October 5. Students wore a different color of the rainbow each day to show support for everyone in the spectrum. Among many events, the week included a coming out vigil and gay prom.

McPherson College (McPherson, KS) - GLOW (Gay, Lesbian or Whatever) is hosting an lgbtq themed film series once a month. The group is also planning to hold awareness-raising events on October 11th for National Coming Out Day.
